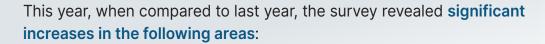

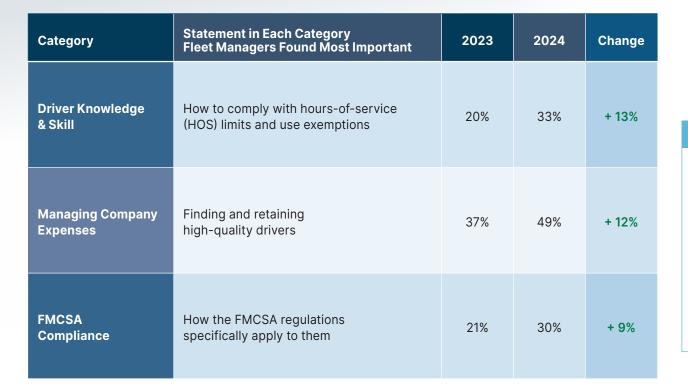

SIGNIFICANT INCREASES (2023-2024)

The transportation industry continues to face a challenging landscape, but can overcome obstacles by committing to continuous improvement, embracing technology, and fostering a culture of safety and compliance.







EXPERT INSIGHT

"Despite widespread use of electronic logs, hours-of-service compliance remains a key concern, with HOS violations making up over 40% of all roadside violations and nearly 1 in 5 violations found during audits in 2023. Toss in a variety of exceptions, and it's no wonder that drivers struggle with HOS compliance."

JOB STRESS

Seventy-four percent (74%) of fleet managers surveyed stated their job was moderately to extremely challenging, with 34% stating their job was extremely or very challenging, the same as in 2023.

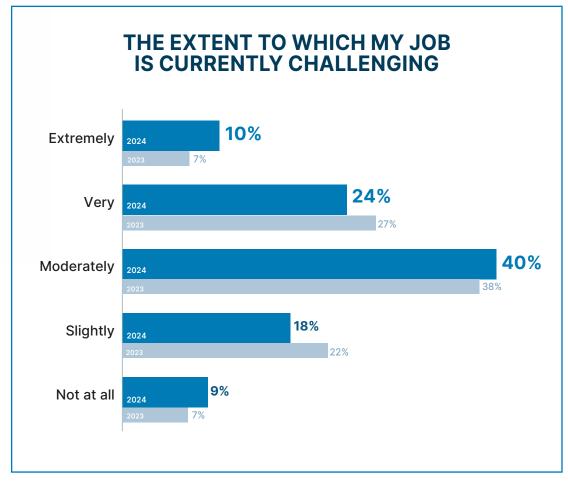
EXPERT INSIGHT

"If you want to be a manager in this industry, either in safety or operations, be prepared.

74% of the respondents rated their jobs as moderately to extremely stressful. On the other end, just 27% said their job was only slightly challenging or not challenging at all. It reminds me of the old firefighter saying, 'Everyone wants to be the chief until you have to do chief things. Then the job gets hard.' Having good people around you and leaning on outside resources can make the job much easier."

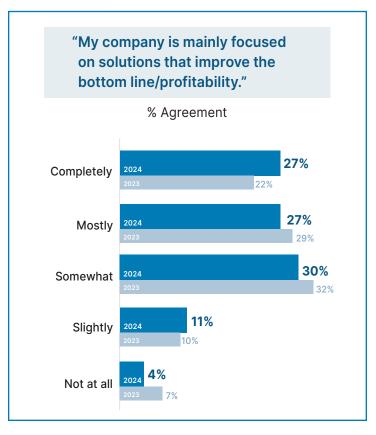
LEADERSHIP PRIORITIES

MANAGEMENT INSIGHT

Securing leadership buy-in is a challenge often heard from safety professionals. If senior management has lost focus on safety, fleet/safety personnel can feel like they are swimming upstream. Often, the friction results from the need to spend money to save money — senior management sees the cost, and safety sees the benefit. The key to success for the entire organization is evaluating data and costs on the consequences of non-compliance or inaction.







DRIVER KNOWLEDGE & SKILLS



Safely and correctly operating a specific vehicle type and knowing how to comply with hours-of-service (HOS) limits and use exceptions were top concerns for survey respondents.

DRIVER KNOWLEDGE

- How to comply with the hours-of-service (HOS) limits and use exemptions (33%)
- How FMCSA regulations apply to them (30%)
- The correct action to take if they are in an accident (25%)

DRIVER SKILLS

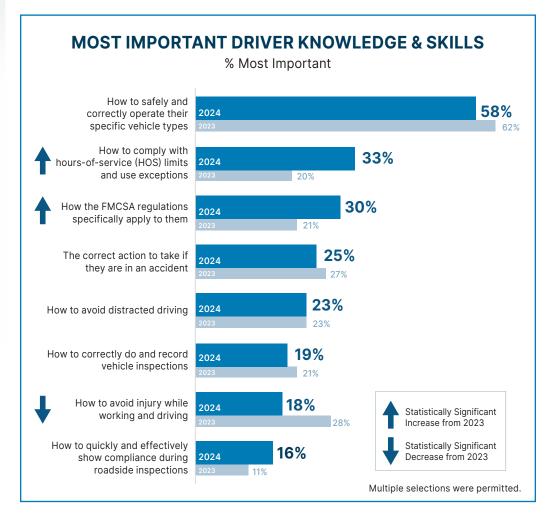
- How to safely and correctly operate their specific vehicle types (58%)
- How to avoid distracted driving (23%)
- How to correctly do and record vehicle inspections (19%)

COMPLIANCE INSIGHT

It's no surprise to see fleet professionals rank compliance with the HOS limits highly when you look at 2023 HOS violations.

- Fatigued operation and HOS violations by commercial motor vehicle (CMV) drivers were cited over 460,000 times in 2023.
- Nearly 41% of all driver violations were attributed to either fatigue or HOS.²

Those were the behaviors caught by enforcement, yet they represent a mere fraction of total fatigued operation and HOS events that happen every year.

DRIVER TRAINING

When it comes to driver training, respondents believe it's most important that their training is specific to the unique needs of their drivers, operations, vehicles or industry (47%) and that drivers apply what they learn in training (45%). Training issues showing year-over-year increases involved flexibility and efficiency in training delivery, with respondents stating a desire for drivers to access training whenever and wherever it's needed with minimal disruption to their daily tasks.

COMPLIANCE INSIGHT

A proactive approach, including training, to building a safe and compliant fleet can minimize the impact of litigation by helping carriers uphold their "duty to act" — a primary consideration for a jury.

A "duty to act" means that you should have been aware of and corrected any safety issues before they resulted in incidents.

Use training, along with ELD and dash cam data, to identify and correct risky behaviors like HOS violations, log falsification, harsh braking, unintended lane departures, distracted driving, or following too close, regardless of your choice to review the data.



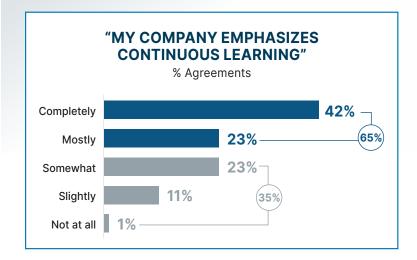

TRAINING METHODS



Sixty-five percent (65%) of those surveyed agree that continuous learning is "mostly" or "completely" emphasized by their company. Unfortunately, 35% felt their company supported continuous learning somewhere between "somewhat" to "not at all."

The most important aspect of overall safety that fleet managers want to see is leadership consistently showing that safety is important (51%).

A close second is employees knowing that they are valued, and that is why fleet managers want them to be safe (46%).

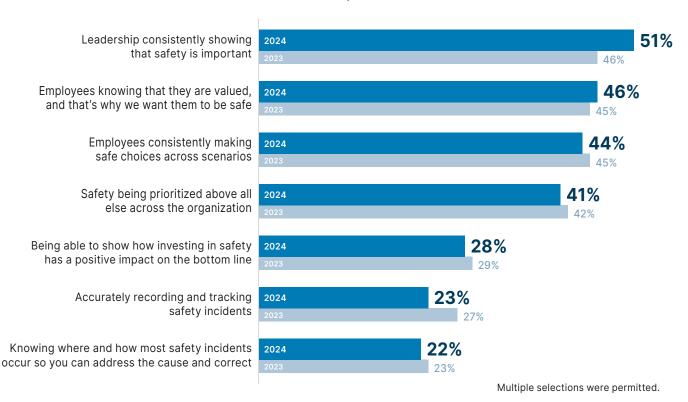

COMPLIANCE

For two years in a row, the most important aspects of FMCSA compliance remain having accurate and well-organized driver files and staying up-to-date on regulatory changes.

Recordkeeping

- Having accurate and well-organized driver qualification/DQ files (47%)
- Having all files together in one place so you can easily prove compliance (25%)
- Having accurate and well-organized drug and alcohol testing records (24%)

Compliance Knowledge

- Staying up-to-date on changes in regulations (39%)
- Understanding how FMCSA changes specifically impact your business (26%)

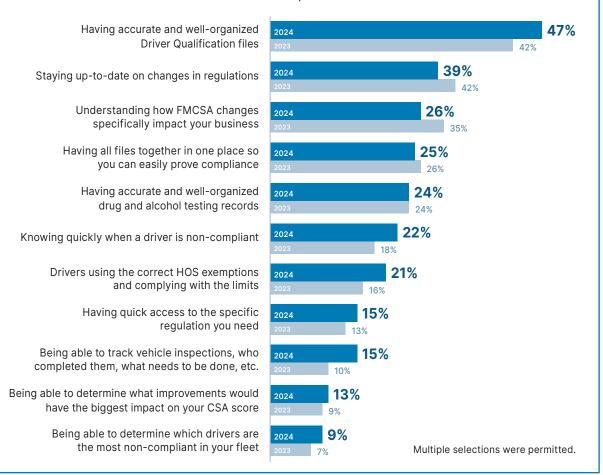

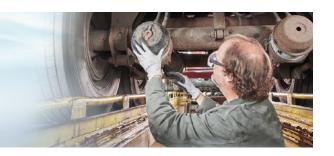
MOST IMPORTANT ASPECTS OF FMCSA COMPLIANCE

VEHICLE MAINTENANCE



Knowing when a vehicle or trailer is damaged or non-compliant (46%) and when a repair is needed (44%) topped the list of most important vehicle maintenance concerns.

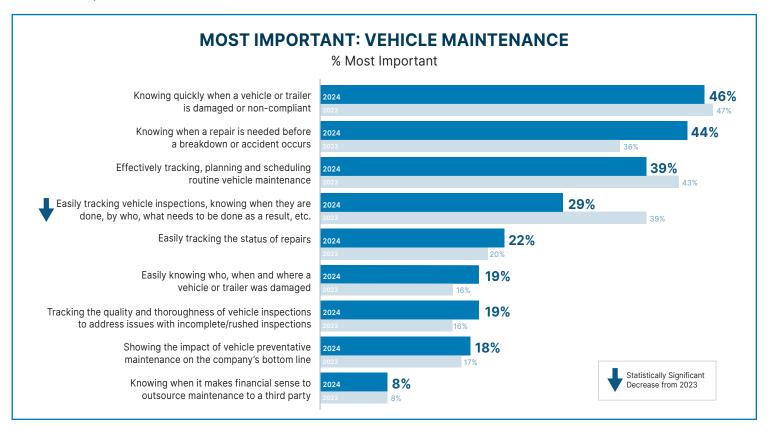
These were followed by effectively tracking routine vehicle maintenance (39%), vehicle inspections (29%) and status of repairs (22%).

EDITOR INSIGHT

"To keep vehicles safe and compliant every day, you need to set up a systematic program that is proactive. Focus on rigorous inspections, and replace components before a failure or being below specification.

Drivers and mechanics need to seek out any minor problems before they balloon into major ones, rather than just reacting to the latest issue that surfaces. Of course, keep all required records; then dispose of them when the retention period expires."

MOST CHALLENGING ASPECTS OF A FLEET MANAGER'S JOB

Open-Ended Comments

The majority of responses revolved around three common areas:

Finding, Hiring, and Retaining Good Drivers

"Employee retention at entry-level positions."

"Hiring and keeping good drivers."

"The most challenging part of this job is finding people who want to work and can follow directions."

Staying Up-to-Date on Regulatory Changes

"Staying on track with all compliance aspects of the company."

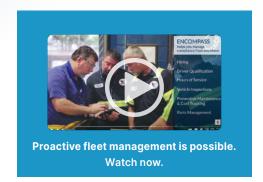
"Staying up to date with changing DOT and OSHA rules."

"The constant changing of FMCSA rules and regulations. Trying to keep up with them all." Paperwork and Recordkeeping

"Having all the paperwork needed and filed."

"Making sure all the information and files are up to date."

"Ensuring all parts of compliance are monitored and records centrally retained."



RESPONDENT DEMOGRAPHICS

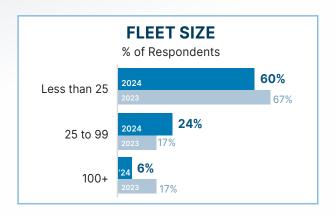


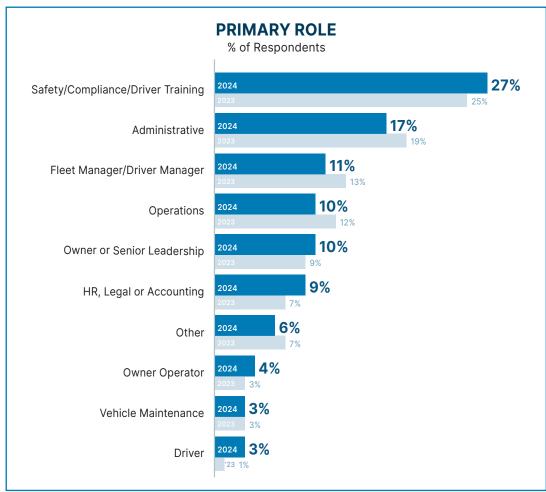
Survey respondents' primary roles range from safety and compliance to driver training, administration, operations, fleet/driver management, driving and warehouse/yard responsibilities.

These individuals know a lot about the industry, making them valuable to an organization.

The survey was fielded January 26 - February 12, 2024 and included 489 unique respondents.

Eighty-four percent (84%) work in fleets with less than 100 trucks, while 60% work in fleets with less than 25 trucks.
